That National Humane Alliance Will Place a Fountain

THE COUNTY SOCIETY MEETS

in This City.

Sam Kaufman Reports on Negotiations

-Complaints to Organization Should be Signed. At the monthly meeting of the Rock

Island County Humane society held last evening in the city council room, Sam Kauffman announced that he had practically completed negotiations with the National Humane Alliance whereby the local organization is to receive one of the large gift fountains. A number of years ago a wealthy man left almost his entire fortune to the

humane alliance to erect gift fountains for the different organizations in the United States. The fountain is worth about \$1,000 and will be shipped here. all charges prepaid, so that the only cost to the organization will be for its installation. A committee consisting of Dr. J. W. Stewart, Dr. Joseph DeSilva, G. C. Wenger, and Sam Kauffman was authorized by the organization to make arrangements for receiving the gift, and to find a location for it. It is thought at the present time that it

will be erected on Market square, but no plans have been made by the committee. The matter of placing the fountain has already been referred to the city council. Humane Officer George Ellman of Davenport was present at the meeting and spoke briefly on the various

subjects that came before the meeting.

Accept the Fountain.

The council voted to accept fountain offered to the city by the National Humane Alliance, referred to in The Argus last evening. The was made in a communication from Lewis Mead Seaver, secretary treasurer of the alliance, who offered the gift through the Rock Island Humane society and particularly Kaufman, its secretary, who was in strumental in bringing the matter to Mr. Seaver's attention. The council on motion of Alderman Smith agreed to the conditions on which the fountain is received, and extended votes of thanks to Mr. Seaver and to Mr. Kaufman. The fountain is given to the city on condition that a site 45 feet from a curb or car line be provided, that the city remove the fountain from the cars and erect it, and that water supply be provided. The fountain is given from a fund left the National Humane Alliance for this purpose by its founder. Hermon Lee Ensign. The fountain is of Maine polished granite, and is 6 feet 8 inches high. A large bowl nearly 6 feet in diameter holds the water, while on the four sides at the bottom are small bowls for dogs and smaller animals. The fountain is equipped with bronze trimmings. It is furnished at a cost of approximately \$1,000.

WATER TURNED ON

Sam Kaufman, Instrumental in Securing Gift, Starts Flow in Ensign Fountain.

MAYOR AND OTHERS PRESENT

Charles Thompson's Horse Takes First Drink—Dogs Quickly Appreciate Its Usefulness.

Sam Kaufman, secretary of the Rock Island County Humane society this morning at 7:30 turned the water on in the Ensign memorial fountain given the city through the society by the National Humane Alliance. Mr. Kaufman went down into the manhole and manipulated the stop cocks of the two pipes. The formality of starting the fountain was witnessed by Mayor Schaffer, Alderman Tuckis, M. H. Sexton, and a few others.

First Horse to Drink.

Charles Thompson's horse was the first to drink from the new fountain. Mr. Thompson waited for some time for the water to be turned on in order that he might allow his horse the first drink. The horse found the water so refreshing that it drank much and long—so long in fact that others about the fountain accused Mr. Thompson of not having given the animal water for a week. He denied the charge however, and the Humane society members will take no action.

Dog Likes It, Too.

It was but a few minutes after the

water had been turned on that a dog learned the advantages of a beautiful fountain from which to secure a drink. It was just an ordinary cur and did not seem to belong to any one in particular. But it was thirtsy, and lapped up the water with evident satisfaction.

Is Beautiful Ornament.

The fountain is a beautiful ornament, besides being a most useful institution. It is made of highly polished Maine granite, ornamented with bronze trimmings. A plate inscribed with the National Humane Alliance name, and explaining the character of the gift, appears on one side. The fountain is provided from a fund left the society for this purpose by Hermon Ensign, who at one time lived in the tri-cities. Similar fountains are being placed in many of the larger cities in the country. The fountain was given with the single condition that the city furnish water supply and drainage, and set it in place at least 45 feet from any curbing or car line.

To be Lighted.

An attractive ornamental light is to be placed on top of the fountain. The lamp and fixture has been ordered in Chicago, and will be placed on the fountain next week. The lamp will be two fect high, a white globe a foot in diameter being mounted on a very beautiful design in bronze.

As has been stated heretofore, it is to be regretted that so fine an orna ment could not have been placed on Market square instead of Flatiroa square. All who have seen the fountain approve the council's expression of appreciation to the Humane Alliance and to Mr. Kaufman for his services in securing the gift.


